Sojitz Participates in Africa Tanzania pre-school Educational Support Program ~Sojitz Group's Social Contribution Activities~

Sojitz Corporation launched in April 2010 a pre-school educational support project in Africa, a priority region of the medium-term management plan Shine 2011.


Educational support is essential in international cooperation as part of social infrastructure like fundamental human rights, and pre-school educational support, in particular, has taken on greater significance in recent years.

Pre-school education refers to education and childcare before primary (elementary) education. It is intended to support the sound physical and mental development of children, develop social skills through group activities, and facilitate the transition to primary education. Furthermore, pre-school education in developing countries is expected to help to reduce the incidence of repeating grades and dropping out of school because of the inability to assimilate into group activities in elementary school, to detect growth problems, which can be difficult to detect in the home, and to reduce the incidence of children not attending school because they have to help taking care of their siblings at home.

The project supported by Sojitz is being conducted in collaboration with Plan Japan, an international NGO that works with children in 65 countries around the world, to promote regional development, to construct a preschool, provide toys for the children and study materials, and enhance the environment for pre-school age children in Tanzania. At the same time, training concerning education before school age is being conducted for the nursery teachers and community leaders so they can conduct more effective educational methods. By encouraging local residents to participate in the project, support is also being provided for the sustained development of communities.



Outline of the Pre-school Educational Support Project



■ This Project and the United National Global Compact

This project is undertaken as one aspect of Sojitz's CSR activities pursuant to the Sojitz Group Statement: The Sojitz Group produces new sources of wealth by connecting the world's economies, cultures and people in a spirit of integrity. Sojitz acts in accordance with the United Nations Global Compact, which it joined in 2009.

The United Nations Global Compact was advocated by former UN Secretary General Kofi Annan at the 1999 World Economic Forum in Davos. By responsibly exercising

creative leadership, businesses can act as good members of society and support the sustained development of society. The Compact consists of the following 10 principles concerning human rights, labor, the environment, and anti-corruption.

Human Rights

Principle 1: Businesses should support and respect the protection of internationally proclaimed human rights; and

Principle 2: make sure that they are not complicit in human rights abuses.

Labour

Principle 3: Businesses should uphold the freedom of association and the effective recognition of the right to collective bargaining;

Principle 4: the elimination of all forms of forced and compulsory labour;

Principle 5: the effective abolition of child labour; and

Principle 6: the elimination of discrimination in respect of employment and occupation.

Environment

Principle 7: Businesses are asked to support a precautionary approach to environmental challenges;

Principle 8: undertake initiatives to promote greater environmental responsibility; and

Principle 9: encourage the development and diffusion of environmentally friendly technologies.

Anti-Corruption

Principle 10: Businesses should work against corruption in all its forms, including extortion and bribery.

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
